Yes. The University has the Information management system (IMS). The IMS portal hosted on the University web site will be updated by the IQAC frequently.

6.3 Quality improvement strategies adopted by the institution for each of the following:

6.3.1 Curriculum Development

- 1) The university is making all efforts to implement the choice based credit system (CBCS) from the academic year 2015-16. Many brain storming session were organised by the IQAC and BoS by inviting academicians from IISC, IITs, IIMs etc., before finalising the curriculum.
- 2) The Deans, Chair persons of BoS and senior faculty are being deputed for the faculty development programs on curriculum design and development organised by various institutes.

6.3.2 Teaching and Learning

- 1) The Deans regularly interact with the chair persons of Academic Monitoring committees (AMC) to review the teaching learning process.
- 2) The AMCs meet at least four times in a semester to review the performance of each class.
- 3) Any suggestions of the student members of AMC on teaching learning process will be immediately implemented by the Chair person of AMC.

6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

- 1) Conduct of internal exams online is initiated.
- 2) All the internal marks will be displayed on the notice boards and posted in the X -learn before finalisation to avoid discrepancies.
- 3) Any grievance of the students on the internal marks will be addressed by the Chair person of AMC.
- 4) All these marks will be vetted by the Departmental committees to avoid any discrepancies.

- 5) The University developed a software for posting of internal marks by the faculty through on line to avoid human errors in entering the marks.
- 6) Process of end exam results is fully computerized.

6.3.4 Research and Development

- 1) The Director, Research Activities regularly interact with the potential faculty and encourage them to apply for research projects to various funding agencies for financial assistance.
- 2) The Director, RA organise brain storming sessions in the subject domain by inviting subject experts.
- 3) The Heads of Institutes conduct meetings with the Head of the Departments and senior faculty to encourage them to apply for development projects like FIST, etc.,
- 4) The Heads of Institutes conduct meetings with the senior faculty of the institute and motivate them to apply for research centres in the thrust areas of the Departments.
- 5) The Principal, College of Engineering taken initiatives for establishment of central research laboratory by keeping all the research equipment under one roof to encourage inter disciplinary research.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

- 1) On the advice of the library advisory committee, the University has taken policy decision to encourage the students towards e learning.
- 2) The Library provided remote access to some of the e-journals.
- 3) Due to the increased use of e-content by the students, on the recommendation of Director of Student Affairs the speed of the internet is enhanced from 1000 to 1355 MBPS and the number of access points are increased.

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

- i.) The university has taken a policy decision to host an open invitation on the website for recruitment of teaching staff to attract the talent.
- ii.) The university allocated budget for skill development to depute the teaching staff to national / international institutions of repute
- iii.) The technical staff are deputed to different organizations for training by conducting need analysis.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

The university identifies the vacancies in the departments by collecting the feedback from HOI's and HOD's. The university recruits the faculty taking the thrust areas of the department also into account.

6.3.8 Industry Interaction / Collaboration

The Director of Consultancy, Projects and Collaborations (CPC) visited various industries and identified their requirement of expertise. Based on the requirement, the Director conducted interactive sessions with the potential faculty and connected them to the concerned industry.

6.3.9 Admission of Students

A separate Directorate of Admissions has been set up for sensitizing the stakeholders on various programs offered by the university through print and electronic media. On the advice of the Admissions Advisory Committee the University decided to adopt digital marketing aggressively from this academic year. An amount of Rs. 8 Crores was allocated towards merit scholarships, merit cum means scholarships and stipend for admission to various UG, PG and Research programs.
