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2.3.2 – Students mentoring system available in the institution? Give details. (maximum 500 words)

The University has a well designed mechanism for student support and mentoring. For this purpose, an Academic Monitoring Committee (AMC) has been constituted for every class, which addresses issues related to review of attendance, classtest results, discipline and other issues related to the students. Further, each faculty member is assigned 20 students to act as a mentor/counselor to monitor the performance of the students in studies, general discipline and their behaviour in the class. Counseling is provided to the students whose performance needs improvement. The counselors regularly inform the parents about their wards? welfare, attendance and academic performance. In addition, the Directorate of Student Affairs reviews and advises on organization and participation of students in co and extracurricular activities. The Directorate of Training Placement assists students by imparting placement training by organizing mock interviews and counseling sessions. The Directorate of Training Placements provides counseling in career opportunities for the aspirants. It also organizes training sessions and arranges for campus placements. All the hostel inmates are provided with regular mentoring by the faculty coordinators beyond class hours in addition to the wardens. Apart from classroom interaction, academic mentoring is provided by way of the following measures: Exclusive counseling hours are scheduled in the time table for the benefit of students. The counselors identify the academic needs of the students and organize additional classes. Tutorial hours are part of the time table which helps the students to have personal interaction with the teachers. The hostel faculty coordinators organize tutorial sessions in the hostels for the slow learners based on their need. The University conducts short term English proficiency courses for improving communication skills.
